Uh Oh....New Ideas

When pastors go to conferences the church should be encouraged because we need refreshing, and we certainly enjoy receiving teaching since most of us are the primary teachers in our settings. But there's also a warning: Watch out! The pastor has been on a conference and he's going to try new ideas on us!

On this last conference I received all kinds of advice regarding evangelism, history lessons about the New Testament church, how to make more effective disciples and a lot more that I've already forgotten. In anticipation of the question, "What did you learn?" I've been thinking about the different speakers, worship services and conversations that occurred during the three days. Surprisingly enough it all came to a head on Thursday morning while I was reading Mark 2 and doing my S.O.A.P. journal.

I read Mark 2:22, "And no one pours new wine into old wineskins. Otherwise, the wine will burst the skins, and both the wine and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins." Jesus was having one of his many confrontations with the Pharisees and they were upset over the disciples not fasting with all the other religious people. I think Jesus was trying to get the point across that with the Son of God in your midst, it makes no sense to fast now. A time will come to fast but timing is important.

One of my highest values is to be a life-long learner. I don't want to ever get to the point where I think I know it all. I was there when I was 16, but I guess I've gone downhill since then. A conference for me is like an amusement park of information. Pour it on and I'll absorb as much as possible. On this last conference the speaker was very creative with pictures, short videos and diagrams. As he was doing his presentation, I was trying to imagine how I would take this home. And I have mixed feelings.

This new information is nothing contrary to the biblical teaching that you have been receiving. It's not a modern take on worship or even introducing a new musical instrument to replace the piano or organ. Much of it is simply teaching on how to live our lives as more effective disciples of Jesus Christ based on the information that we already know in God's Word.

So, where do the mixed feelings come in? I've done this before. Maybe like Jesus, I have some new wine, but the church likes the old wine just fine. I have suggested new wineskins only to be told that our structures have worked this long, don't fix it if it ain't broken. I feel like I'm in a constant state of renovation, and I'm attracted to people who also recognize that Jesus is constantly working on them too. What has been your reaction to 'new ideas'? Are you receptive or skeptical? I think we can be both. The question arises for me, "How can I be faithful to Jesus Christ within my current context?" Can our congregation ask the same question? Are any of us holding onto old wineskins? When was the last time I tasted any new wine?

May we wrestle these 'new ideas' if they are new, and trust that God will grow and guard His church until Jesus returns.

GRATITUDE IN DARK TIMES Martin Rinkart (1586-1649)

Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus. ~*I Thessalonians* 5:18

Martin Rinkart wanted to weep. How many more funerals would he need to perform before the greedy jaws of war and plague would finally close? He had just finished preaching over the body of today's fiftieth victim. Little did he know that he would bury 4,400 people in his town of Eilenburg in Saxony before year's end.

Rinkart was the only clergyman in a city flooded with refugees from the Thirty-Year's War. Wherever he looked, the victims of hunger, poverty, and bloodshed were strewn like rotting flowers across the city streets. To make matters worse, the devastating pestilence of 1637 had swept through the city, claiming hundreds as its prey – among them Rinkart's wife.

If any man's cup of suffering was overflowing, it was Rinkart's. Yet the sorrow he endured never eclipsed his faith and hope. Instead, he used these dark years of his ministry to write a hymn that has sparked hope in hearts for more than three centuries.

NOW THANK WE ALL OUR GOD

Now thank we all our God with heart and hands and voices, Who wondrous things hath done, In whom His world rejoices; Who, from our mothers' arms, hath blessed us on our way With countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

With the world unraveling around him, Rinkart refused to bow to despair. Instead, he praised God, thanking Him for the "countless gifts of love" and the "wondrous things" He had done.

Martin Rinkart lived to see the end of the Thirty-Years' War. When the Peace of Westphalia was concluded, the hymn sung in celebration was none other than Rinkart's *"Now Thank We All Our God."* The tune composed by Rinkart's contemporary, Johann Cruger (1598-1662), has been borrowed by composers from Bach to Mendelssohn. Even now its strains seem to embody the essence of Christian gratitude and praise.

Few of us have known the prolonged, sharp-edged suffering that Rinkart endured, but all of us have experienced times of grief, rejection and pain from which we thought we might never emerge. How can we possibly experience the gratitude and hope evident in Rinkart's words?

Fortunately, Martin Rinkart's secret is still available to us, and it is rooted in a relationship with Christ. I challenge you today to praise God for His countless gifts of love – even if you don't feel that love. As Paul exhorted the Philippian believers: "Rejoice in the Lord always." (Phil. 4:4). As I praise God, I feel joy. As I praise, my vision is lifted beyond my current short-sightedness. As I praise, my spirit is lifted so that I feel the love of God, who is Love.


