Pickett's Charge

The Humility of God

(Exerpts from an article by Dr. Andrew Swafford) "When we hear the word "humility," many of us think of low self-esteem and self-deprecation: I for one used to envision



the ideal as making a concerted effort to disavow the truth of any compliment ever received. The Christian tradition, however, has never quite seen humility this way. In fact, the above is something of a caricature. For St. Thomas Aquinas, humility is about recognizing the *truth* about oneself, which entails recognizing both our limitations *and* our gifts. For example, if someone told Lebron James that he is one of the greatest basketball players ever to

play—and if Lebron gave credit to his coaches and those who have helped him along the way and ultimately to God—then Lebron could say in all humility, "Thank you" and simply acknowledge the truth of the statement."

Building upon this framework, C. S. Lewis captures the essence of humility in his *Screwtape Letters*, writing: *"By this virtue, as by all others, God wants to turn our attention away from self, to Him and to our neighbors."* For Lewis, humility is not a matter of thinking less *of* ourselves—but less *about* ourselves, forgetting ourselves and turning outward in love.

Pride and vanity are restrictive, turning us inward—ultimately making us sad, insecure, and restless. Humility, on the other hand, is expansive—turning us outward, and making possible an encounter with true joy.

So, as we look toward Advent...the anticipation of the coming of the Christ child and ultimately to Christ's second coming...what is our view of God? The all powerful, intimidating, worship me or die, impersonal FORCE? He could have been anything He wanted and yet He chose to enter this universe as a weak, vulnerable child...born to a poor couple in a stable. Does God have self-image problems? Many objected to His marketing strategy. In John 7 we read, *"Jesus' brothers said to him, "Leave Galilee and go to Judea, so that your disciples there may see the works you do. No one who wants to become a public figure acts in secret. Since you are doing these things, show yourself to the world."*

If God is humble, what are we to think of ourselves? I quoted a writer earlier this fall saying, "Pride is the chief of all sins...from it all other sins come." Let us approach Christmas this year as He did, meek and humble, as a servant of all. Imagine what our community would look like if we each adopted that attitude?

How about this: Whenever you wish someone a "Merry Christmas" look for a way to serve them.

Eric's Gift by Markus Compton

"Come, they told me, dum-ditty-dum-dum..." I stopped the chorus of four-year-olds midstream in the song and looked directly at Eric.

"Eric, this song is called 'The Little Drummer Boy" I spoke sternly, "and the words are 'Come, they told me, pa-rum-pum-pum,' not 'dum-ditty-dum-dum.' And Eric, you don't need to yell."

"Eric, Eric, Eric," I muttered under my breath as I walked back to the music stand.

Eric had two speeds: on and off. I never saw off. I imagined "off" happened for Eric sometime between 1 and 3am. He simply could not hold still. He shifted; he twitched; he giggled; he yawned; and when he sang, he yelled. This shiny-faced wisp of a boy had more energy that any child I had ever met!

But I must admit, there was much about Eric that was lovable. Through all his perpetual motion, he smiled. In fact, he never quit smiling. And when Eric's grin caught you head-on, it was impossible to stay mad at him.

Two times a week, on the front row of the preschool chorus, Eric stood grinning and velling; although in all fairness to him, he thought he was singing! He raised the roof, if not our spirits!

There were, however, a couple of problems with that. One, Eric was one of a handful of children bused from the other side of town. His enthusiasm alone made him the uncontested star of the chorus. Some mothers were upset that he was stealing the show. Two, Eric could never remember the correct words and it usually resulted in the other kids just singing along with him, incorrectly. I was trying to work on both problems. I sent the song home with Eric to memorize.

The final rehearsal went well until we got to "The Little Drummer Boy". "Come they told me," was followed by hesitation, then silence. The piano went on with the melody, but the four-year-olds were so confused with hum and dum and pum that they simple froze. Except for Eric. "Dum-ditty-dum-dum," he finished the phrase.

"That's it!" I screamed and stopped the chorus. "We are not singing about the seven dwarfs! This is a Christmas song, a *special* song about a little boy just like you--except that he lived long ago when baby Jesus was born. He was poor, but he wanted more than anything to visit the newborn baby in the manger. When he got there, he saw kings and wise men waiting to see baby Jesus. They all had expensive gifts to give the Christ child-things like gold and jewels and perfume. Well, when the boy saw all those fancy people with all their expensive gifts, he just about turned around and went home. I mean, he was just a kid with nothing to give. About the only thing he could do was play his drum.

"But then he looked around and realized that baby Jesus, too, was poor, that He was born in a stable. So when it was the boy's turn to see Jesus, he asked if he could play his drum for the baby, and Mary said yes. Well, everyone loved it, and the boy learned that the best gift you can give is the gift of yourself.

I finished the story and satisfied that the children understood it, went on: "When we sing the song, we are making the sound of the little boy's drum. It is a p sound. Everybody say it with me: 'pa, pa, pum.' Now everyone say 'pum' twenty times."

While the preschool chorus repeated the words, I looked at the clock. I had taken too long telling the story and our rehearsal time was gone. "Okay, children," I finished up, "there is no more time to practice, but you have to remember the drum sound makes a p sound."

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Exhausted I walked back to the rear of the auditorium and spoke to their classroom teacher. "Tell me about Eric," I requested.

"Well, there isn't much to tell. He is an only child being raised by his grandmother. We've never met her. Eric told us she didn't want to come to Back to School Night because she was afraid someone would find out she can't read."

I went to the office to look up more on Eric's records. He lived alone with his paternal grandmother and there was no phone number, just an address. I wrote a special note inviting her to the program and sent it home--pinned to Eric's shirt! Surely, if his grandmother couldn't read, she knew someone who could read it to her.

The day of the Christmas program arrived. The parents came armed with cameras and video recorders. I stood in the hall with the preschool chorus, they were all excited and wiggling even more than usual. I barked out some last-minute instructions and we were off.

Without a hitch, the children went through the songs: "Jingle Bells," "Silent Night," "Away in a Manger." This little crew looked and sounded, for all present, like a chorus of angels.

I turned the music on my stand to "The Little Drummer Boy," signaled the piano to begin. During the introduction, I mouthed the *pum* sound with my lips to the children.

"Come, they told me..." they started right on cue. "Pum-ditty-pum-pum..." There was no stopping them now. "I am a poor boy, too...." I could hear the audience snickering. "Mary nod-ded...pum-ditty-pum-pum! By now, only about three children were singing with Eric. The noise from the audience had scared the others. By the end, the children were frozen and embarrassed, and so was I. Finally, and I mean *finally*, the song ended, and a bunch of bewildered four year-olds bowed and got off stage.

Before I could get out of school, the hallway filled with parents and children. Leading the pack was Eric, pulling a short, gray-haired woman by the hand. "Mr. C., this is my grandma." "She rode the bus all the way here to see the program and wants to tell you thanks!" he yelled.

"Well, I'm happy to meet you," I said. "Eric is..." There was a vacant stare in her bright eyes. I suddenly noticed large hearing aids in both ears. She smiled, obviously confused.

"She says she's happy to meet you, too," Eric blurted out. He was acting as translator for his grandmother, who I now realized was almost totally deaf. "Boy, isn't Christmas great?" Eric continued. "Sorry I sang so loud, but that song about the little drummer boy is such a great story, I wanted my grandma to hear it!"

Eric's grandmother didn't seem to hear a word we were saying. But standing there silently in a purple-flowered dress, she could see Eric's excitement and love of the music. She looked at me for a moment, her eyes filled with tears, and spontaneously reached up to hug me. "Thank you," she whispered.

"Thank you," I said back. "Thank you for Eric."

Tenderly she took her grandson's hand and I watched them walk down the hall, Eric bouncing at her side all the way, singing: "Pum-ditty-pum-pum!"

I never hear "The Little Drummer Boy" without remembering Eric's gift to his grandmother and her gift of unconditional love for him. I never read the story of that little drummer boy without recalling the miracle in the manger: God's greatest gift of all---His love. I realize that when I sometimes tune Him out, God yells His love to me. And every time I sing this carol, though I don't sing it that way out loud, in my heart the words will always be "pum-ditty-pum-pum!"

Merry Christmas and may God's love fill your heart this season and all year long!
