Pickett's Charge

What's the Big Deal about the Reformation?

Martin Luther loved God and he loved the church. He did not set out to be a subversive and undermine the teachings of the Roman Catholic church but he honestly wanted to *reform* some of the teachings that he felt had gone off the rails. So, he came up with 95 ideas that he wanted the church to consider. Also known as "Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences". Why did he nail them to the door? The Buildings and Grounds committee would have probably gotten upset at this defacing of church property. I guess he didn't have any duct tape on hand.

He listed many things such as the limited power of the Pope, the selling of indulgences for the forgiveness of sins of those in purgatory, and can another be forgiven of sin by our prayers? He also was angry about the Pope wanting to build the Basilica of St. Peter using the money of poor people. But his primary emphasis was the epiphany that he had about justification by faith and the primacy of Scripture. Each person is responsible for their own salvation by believing on the efficacy of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ **ALONE**!

There was even here-say that a local Catholic cleric came up with a little ditty to encourage people to buy their indulgences: "As soon as the coin in the coffer rings, the soul from purgatory springs"

Luther was not a perfect man by any means. Some have written that he wrestled with how he should feel about the Jewish race. He also struggled greatly with depression. God had given him prophetic insight and he felt very alone in the proclamation of these 'new' biblical ideas. Imagine too, that standing against the Pope was a dangerous thing. The Pope in those days was often more involved in politics and questioning his authority could mean a death sentence.

The Pope did declare him to be a heretic and Luther had to hide from the authorities. Luther was eventually excommunicated for refusing to recant but thanks to the printing press invented about that same time by Gutenberg, his 95 Theses were distributed throughout Europe within a couple of months.

What I appreciate about Martin Luther is his obedience to the Word regardless of the consequences. He recognized that his standing before God was much more important than his reputation before men. We don't read very much about his wife but she must have put up with a lot. Not only his infamous notoriety but his frequent bouts of depression. I am thankful that they persisted and encouraged other brave men and women to defy the Catholic church banking on favor with God over popularity with people.

Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. Romans 5:1,2



EXCELLENCE VERSUS SUCCESS

Franz Schubert (1797-1828)

Serve wholeheartedly, as if you were serving the Lord, not men, because you know that the Lord will reward everyone for whatever good he does. Ephesians 6: 7-8

In his short, thirty-one year life, Franz Schubert composed hundreds of the world's most beautiful songs, not to mention fantastic symphonies, sonatas, chamber music and choral works---all while being virtually ignored and neglected by the world. I have had the opportunity to visit the shabby house where Schubert was born and lived; it was a profoundly moving experience.

The great music that the poverty-stricken Schubert created seldom brought him any money. Even when he composed something that became popular in his time---such as his extraordinary song, the "Erl-King"---his lack of business experience prevented him from realizing appropriate profits. Having little financial sense, Schubert sold the "Erl-King" rights for a few dollars.

Many of his greatest works were not even performed during his lifetime. For example, at one point Schubert completed two orchestral movements and sketched two more, presumably working out an entire symphony. For reasons unknown to history, he abandoned this project and sent away the manuscript. Nearly forty years after Schubert's death, one of his friends retrieved the score. Now known as Schubert's *Unfinished Symphony*, this work has become the most acclaimed musical fragment in music history.

Yet the lack of public accolades seemed to have no effect on the incredible output of this genius. Schubert once stated, "When one piece is finished, I begin another." He even went to bed with his glasses on. The reason? He wanted to begin composing as soon as he awoke!

What enables a man to continue his toil without the external motivation of applause and wealth?

Schubert never strove for success; he strove for *excellence*. His motivation was simply to use his God-given talents to the best of his ability, whether anyone responded or not.

The relative obscurity of Schubert's short life gives us few details of his opinions and convictions. Yet the little we know testifies to a strong, personal faith in Christ, which sustained him through the years of unrewarded labor. His paramount audience was not the concertgoers or even his musical friends, but the Lord Himself.

From time to time stop and ask yourself a hard question: "Would I be doing this if no one but God would ever know about it? Am I striving for excellence – to do my best for Christ – or for worldly success?" No matter how respectable our work may seem to our peers, the motives we bring to each task will be appraised by our supreme Rewarder. For *"Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart" (I Samuel 16: 7).*


